FROM THE DIRECTOR:

Growing up in the 60's I often heard stories from my grandparents and parents about surviving the Great Depression. My Grandma Jorgensen lived her entire life with the results of contracting polio as a child. My mom was a Registered Dietician who has

spoken of working during epidemics through her long career in the hospital. I do not know if it is the Scandinavian work ethic or lots of coffee, but she has survived all these challenges and is a very healthy and active 90-year-old. Stories of Strength, heroics and determination have helped

Since March 18, 2020, the Food Bank has served growing numbers of neighbors through a variety of emergency programs as well as keeping all our regular programs available. This has involved serving our Fireweed Diner meals in a "to go" style, providing the TEFAP, CSFP and perishable foods in a prepackaged manner to expedite the food distribution process and keep everyone safe. It has involved partnering with the USDA Farmers to Families program that enabled us to provide fresh produce distributions across the Peninsula. One of our silver linings during the pandemic has been getting to know our **community** partners and see the amazing work they are doing. e appreciate that the cities of **Kenai and Soldotna** have formed a partnership to distribute Cares Act funds in the form of food bags. This is a very targeted effort to address the immediate emergency need that the public health crisis has produced and will be available until December 30, 2020.

Many thanks to Conoco and Hilcorp for providing thousands of the bags and others who have been willing to contribute what they have.

Volunteers and staff have been assembling and distributing 650 bags a week. Each bag contains 15lbs of food, a weeks supply of food for 2 people. These bags contain a variety of shelf stable items such as cereal, peanut butter, jelly, fruit cups, and juice, with the Food Bank adding bread, and any fresh or perishable items that are available at the time. World Polio Day was established by Rotary International to commemorate the birth of Jonas Salk, who led the first team to develop a vaccine against poliomyelitis. Polio Today: When Rotary and its partners formed the GPEI in 1988, there were 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries every year. Today, they have reduced polio

cases by 99.9 percent, and just two countries continue to report cases of wild poliovirus: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Because of the efforts of Rotary and its partners, nearly 19 million people who would otherwise have been paralyzed are walking, and more than 1.5 million people are alive who would otherwise have died. The infrastructure they helped build to end polio is also being used to treat and prevent other diseases (including COVID-19) and create lasting impact in other areas of public health.


